# **MINUTES**

Richland Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting #3-2013 Richland City Hall – 505 Swift Boulevard – Council Chambers Thursday, March 14, 2013 ~ 7:00 pm

#### **CALL TO ORDER:**

Chair Gutierrez called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm.

#### ATTENDANCE:

Chair Gutierrez, Vice Chair Jones, Commissioners Doran, Katipamula, Beck, Bern and Richards were present. Commissioner Maya was absent. Also in attendance were Council Liaison Kent, Parks and Recreation Director Schiessl and Parks and Recreation Managers Pinard and Strand.

### **APPROVAL OF THE MARCH 14, 2013, AGENDA:**

Nancy Doran **moved** to approve the February 13, 2013, revised agenda as submitted. Shanta Katipamula **seconded** the motion. Motion carried.

# **APPROVAL OF THE FEBRUARY 13, 2013, MINUTES:**

Vice Chair Jones **moved** to approve the February 13, 2013, minutes as presented. Nancy Doran **seconded** the motion. Motion carried.

### **COUNCIL LIAISON REPORT:**

Council member Kent welcomed the public. She reported that at their last City Council meeting the Keene Road Trail Corridor Master Plan and donations to fund Parks and Recreation expenditures such as scholarships, memorial benches and movies in park were approved. Council Member Kent also reported that the Regional Public Facilities District is encouraging the public to comment on the aquatic center prior to placement on the ballot this fall and the next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, March 20.

### **PUBLIC COMMENTS:**

Carrie Kline, 306 Comstock, voiced her concerns regarding the proposed Community Gardens at Barth Park. Ms. Kline noted limited parking, potential allergens, increase crime and suggested other park locations that would be more suitable.

Public Comments Closed at 7:12 pm.

#### RECREATION REPORT:

Parks and Recreation Manager Laurel Strand reported that the annual Morning with Mr. Bunny...and Pancakes Too! Is March 30 and includes a coloring contest. Also, HeartChase co-sponsored by Kadlec Medical Center, is March 23. Ms. Strand added that the Facilities Division recently added a 100' zip line at Goethals Park.

#### PRESENTATIONS:

Craig Chiesa – Tri-City Kart Club - presented an overview of its club accomplishments. Mr. Chiesa described its past races and upcoming regional and national events. The Tri-City Kart Club will hold a spring jamboree as a fundraiser for the Cancer Center. He also noted that the Tri-City Kart Club will bid on the future Grand National event.

Ken Buechler – Columbia Basin BMX – provided an update of recent additions to the property that includes trees, safety fences and bleachers. Mr. Buechler also noted that fiber optics was buried near the restrooms and security cameras have been installed. Mr. Buechler also thanked the Parks and Recreation Commission, staff, donors and volunteers.

Debbie Berkowitz – Native Plant Society – explained that grant dollars from the Park Partnership Funds were used to build a silt barrier fence near North Leslie Groves Park along Snyder to Ferry St. to help prevent weeds and accumulation of leaves.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

# 1. Master Plan Approval for Unnamed Park at Corner of Westcliffe and Gala Way

Senior Park Planner Dave Bryant indicated that staff had met with three nearby homeowners associations regarding the city-acquired three acre park at the corner of Westcliffe and Gala Way. Mr. Bryant described the proposed park and its amenities which also include an 8' pathway around the park and native grasses. Vice Chair Jones **moved** to forward a recommendation to City Council to approve the Neighborhood Park Master plan. Jackie Valentino **seconded** the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Bryant also added that the neighbors will be suggesting names for the park and will be forwarded to Commission for approval.

# 2. Barth Park Community Gardens

Parks and Recreation Manager Phil Pinard presented the background on the proposed Barth Park Community Gardens noting that over 180 flyers had been distributed in the area and eight comments were received back opposing the proposed project. Mr. Pinard also noted that the City had been contacted by The Richland Home Depot about an interest in a local project and from a list of projects that were presented, were interested in creating a community garden at Barth Park.

Discussion ensued on other possible park locations. Other discussion items included maintenance costs, crime statistics and input from local businesses and neighbors. It was determined to discuss these topics further at the March workshop.

### 3. Discussion of Parks and Recreation Commission Position #7

Vice Chair Greg Jones **moved** to recommend to City Council to vacate Parks and Recreation Commission Position No. 7 consistent with performance obligations of Richland Municipal Code 2.04.110 and 2.18.020 and initiate a recruitment effort. Nancy Doran **seconded** the motion. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:16 pm.

# **BACKGROUND**

Notification of the availability of Park Partnership Program applications was advertised in the Tri-City Herald on January 20, 2013 and February 3,2013. Notification was also sent to the past five year applicants.

A total of four applications were received all meeting the criteria for eligibility:

1. Columbia Center Rotary: application to purchase and install a slide and landscaping at the Goethals Nature Playground.

- 2. Tri-City Dog Park Society: application to purchase and install two drinking fountains and new ground surface cover at the high use area in the two acre section of the dog playground.
- Columbia Basin BMX: application to purchase and install: a new starting gate, safety fencing at the track corners, sprinklers, microphone, drainfield and broadband equipment.
- 4. North Leslie Groves Natural Area Restoration Group: application to purchase and install a split rail fence to replace the utility pole fence at the corner of Snyder St. and Harris Street.

The total funding request is \$20,000.

Each applicant was notified April 1, 2013, that they must present the application to the Parks and Recreation Commission at their April 11, 2013, regular meeting.

Staff has reviewed each application and determined that all four meet the criteria established for the Park Partnership Program.

# **Project Information**

Name of Park: Leslie Groves

**Project Location in Park:** The portion of the park just north of Snyder, between the bike path and Harris.

Brief Description of Project: We started a native plant restoration project in Leslie Groves North in 2006. This area was initially almost entirely weeds; we have spent the past 7 years mowing, raking, and pulling weeds, and planting and seeding native plants. These activities usually take between 200 and 300 hrs/yr. In the past couple of years, the growth of the native plants has created a problem with leaves from the developed area of the park and from the neighborhood. The large quantities of leaves being trapped would choke out the plants if left in place. Last year, P&RC granted us \$685 to install a 3 ft tall silt fence from October to February to trap the leaves; this worked very well as you saw in the report I gave in March, significantly cutting down the amount of time needed for raking. Labor for reinstalling the silt fence each year would cost \$500, so while this is one option, a more permanent solution would be preferable. We propose installing a three-rail split rail fence that could replace the telephone poles which are currently around the perimeter of our work area at on Snyder and Harris to inhibit vehicle access. The split rail fence could provide that same function while also serving as a support for easily attaching silt fence material or weed cloth during the fall. The fence would be ~3ft tall; it would be open and have gaps so as not to block views or passage of people and animals.

# **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

That the Parks and Recreation Commission recommend Council adopt a master plan for community gardens at Barth Park.

# **MOTION FOR CONSIDERATION**

I move that the Parks and Recreation Commission recommend Council identify Barth Park as a location for community gardens.

### **FISCAL IMPACT**

The Home Depot will provide all the materials and labor to construct the community gardens. Some parks and facilities crew time will be required for site preparation and irrigation modifications.

# **BACKGROUND**

In September of 2009, staff presented to the Commission suggestions on repurposing parks in south central Richland to increase use of the parks. In October of 2009, a public meeting was held to gather residents input on park repurposing ideas. Approximately 25 people attended the meeting.

Since 2009, the nature playground has been created at Goethals Park and the lineal arboretum has begun in Gillespie Parkway with the planting a variety of tree species.

In January of 2013, the City was contacted by Isaac Hall the store manager of the Richland Home Depot. They expressed an interest in becoming involved in a community project. From a list of several projects they are very interested in creating a community garden at Barth Park.

Staff's goal has been to establish community gardens in north, central, south central and south Richland. Currently gardens are provided in central (McMurray Park) and south Richland (Venus Dr.).

Nearly 200 flyers were left at neighborhood homes in the vicinity of Barth Park. We received 14 responses, eight opposed to community gardens, three in favor and three that suggested a combined use. These comments have been attached to the staff report.

This item was discussed at the February workshop and Barth Park and Gillespie Parkway were included in the PRC park tour on March 16, 2013.

Flyers were delivered to the Gillespie Parkway neighbors regarding community gardens at Gillespie Parkway and no comments have been received as of April 1, 2013.

# <u>ANALYSIS</u>

Barth Park is located at the intersection of Barth Ave. and Comstock Street and is 0.35 acres. It currently has a swing set and basketball court.

Other public spaces in this park service area are: Gillespie Parkway, Craighill Park (three blocks to the west), Goethals Park, Goethals Shelterbelt, Abbott Shelterbelt and Lewis & Clark Elementary School.

Community gardens at Barth Park will require the relocation of the basketball court to Craighill Park and removal of the existing swing set as the gardens would be fenced to control access. Irrigation modifications and removal of the three trees at the corner of the park would also be necessary. The trees would be removed to provide the necessary sunlight. The irrigation system would be modified with sprinkler heads removed and hose bids installed.

All four sides of the park are fenced but to support gardens the 4 foot fence along Barth and Comstock would be replaced with a 5-6 foot high chain link fence with a maintenance access gate and man gate.

Approximately 4,100 square feet of garden are could be provided if the entire park was used. This equates to 36-10 x 10 plots and 11- 5 x10 plots. Currently McMurray Park has 2,930 square feet of garden are and the south Richland garden has 1,500 square feet.

Current users of Barth Park would have to travel three blocks on Comstock Street to Craighill Park. There are no sidewalks on the south side of Comstock and one block of sidewalk on the north side. A basketball court would be constructed at Craighill Park.

An alternate location for gardens at the west end of Gillespie Parkway would provide for expansion, if necessary, to provide more garden space than Barth Park would allow. A new water main to serve the gardens would have to be extended from Cullum Ave., 400 feet to the east. Fencing would also be necessary around the perimeter of the garden area.

Gillespie Parkway has been established as an arboretum and a variety of tree species have been planted in the last several years.

Staff will generate a master plan for the preferred location following PRC discussion.

In 2006 Council approved the master plan for John Dam Plaza (Attachment 2). Implementation of the master plan began in 2011 with the construction of the restroom building and in 2012 with an addition of an art sculpture in the northwest corner.


In March staff received \$48,000 of Business License Reserve Fund grant to construct sidewalks with the plaza.

Recent improvements to George Washington Way eliminated the midblock cross walk in front of the Red Lion Inn and reviewing other sidewalk needs and locations staff has prepared a revised master plan which modifies the sidewalk locations (Attachment 3).

These changes were reviewed with the Commission at their March 28<sup>th</sup> workshop.

# JOHN DAM PLAZA MASTER PLAN Modified 3-12-13



**Debris Barrier** 

# **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the Commission recommend to Council allocation of \$15,000 of Undesignated Park Reserve Funds and \$20,000 of Park District 3 funds to the Columbia Point Boat Basin debris barrier.

# **MOTION FOR CONSIDERATION**

I move to recommend Council allocate \$15,000 of Undesignated Park Reserve Funds and \$20,000 of Park District 3 funds toward improvements to the debris barrier at the north opening of the Columbia Point boat basin

# **FISCAL IMPACT**

The year-end projection for the Undesignated Park Reserve Fund is \$21,400 and the current balance in Park District 3 is \$30,983. The Richland Yacht Club lease contributes approximately \$20,000 per year into the Undesignated Park Reserve Fund.

### **BACKGROUND**

For the past several years the City and the Richland Yacht Club have explored options to improve or replace the existing debris barrier at the north opening of the boat basin.

In 2007 the City and the Yacht Club partnered to hire the consulting firm of HDR to study the channel hydraulics and make recommendations on debris barrier options. Meetings were held with representatives of the Corps of Engineers and the federal fisheries agencies to discuss impacts relating to each option.

In August of 2009 the final report was submitted by HDR. The report analyzed seven different options: culverts, dredging the river, trash rack system, rotating screen trash rack, large boom system, barbs and self-cleaning motorized trash rack. The preferred alternative was a combination of dredging the main channel, new configuration and installation of existing and new debris booms, and bioengineered streambank protection with an estimated cost of \$1,727,000.

In 2011 staff received an estimate for the culvert option for \$300,000 to \$500,000.

In 2011 staff received a proposal from the Watershed Company for improving the debris barrier in a three phase solution with the first phase being: repairing the existing boom, replacing the failed underwater screening and adding new boom sections to attach to an anchor on the shore. Phase 2 is installing an additional exterior boom which would extend further downstream.

In 2012 the Yacht Club received a proposal from River Ranch, (Inspired Iron) to fabricate and install a debris cable system between the existing H beam piles using stainless steel cable. The cable barrier would be anchored to the shore on both sides of the opening. The quote to perform the work is \$50,000. This proposal is very similar to the Watershed Company Phase 1 proposal.

The Yacht Club and City will partner in this project as both parties are affected by the debris entering the boat basin.

# Park Tour

On Saturday, March 16, the Parks and Recreation Commission completed a tour of park facilities in northwest Richland including portions of the Tapteal Trail along the Yakima River, the Horn Rapids Motocross Track, Horn Rapids Kart Track, Hanford Legacy Park, and the Horn Rapids Athletic Complex. The PRC is scheduling quarterly tours so that members are familiar with facility users and current issues in the City's park system.





# Reach Beyond Challenge Ropes Course

On Saturday, March 16, 2013 Recreation Coordinator Doug Hagedorn and Recreation Assistant Jen Davis passed the requalification testing for the Ropes/Challenge Course located in Columbia Park. Having Doug and Jen as Ropes/Challenge Course facilitators is useful in programming our Outdoor Adventure Series and they have also facilitated Parks and Recreation staff training at the course.



# National Swimming Pool Foundation - Certified Pool Operator

On Friday, March 29, Recreation Coordinator Doug Hagedorn and Parks and Facilities staff members Wes Johnson and Tom Garcia completed the National Swimming Pool Foundation – Certified Pool Operator Course. The 16-hour course covered 18 chapters of pool operations information, followed by a certification test on the final day. The certification is in effect for five years and satisfies a recommendation of the Benton Franklin Health Department.



# **Community Gardens**

The Community Gardens opened for the season on Friday, March 15. The gardeners are excited to begin working in their garden plots. Park Ranger Jen was meeting with Master Gardeners at McMurray Garden on Friday when she saw four generations of a family working in their garden plot. People agree it is great that the City of Richland provides space for

Richland citizens to garden together - to create a shared vision, to work collaboratively, and to cultivate a place for individuals, families and friends to learn about and experience the rewards of gardening.



# 2013 March for Respect

2013 March for Respect, which celebrates citizens with developmental disabilities, was another huge success. An estimated 700 people were in attendance and enjoyed musical performances and speeches from local and state officials. Richland's Parks and Recreation member Maria Commission Gutierrez delivered a message of inclusion to the crowd. The march was led by Senator Jerome Delvin and his wife. Free hot dogs and drinks were provided by "People First," while the Richland Firefighters provided an impressive and inspiring display of the American Flag.



#### **HeartChase Tri-Cities**

The second annual HeartChase Tri-Cities took place under sunny skies on Saturday, March 23<sup>rd</sup>. HeartChase consists of two to five person teams walking to ten different checkpoints in Richland. At each checkpoint there was a task that must be completed to earn points. The tasks involve health related challenges and education. The event was headquartered at the Richland Community Center with checkpoints in various parks and facilities in Richland, including Howard Amon Park, Fire Station One, John Dam Plaza, Carol Woodruff Plaza and the Bradley Boulevard parking lot. Seventy-eight teams



participated in the event, up from forty-eight teams last year. HeartChase raised more than \$33,000 for the American Heart Association.

With more than 500 people in attendance, Morning with Mr. Bunny...and Pancakes too! continues to grow larger each year. Councilman Phil Lemley expertly flipped pancakes onto the plates of the hungry crowd while more than 20 volunteers took charge of additional duties. After pancakes, the children moved on to the craft tables where they constructed a variety of bunny items, including bunny ears to wear. And then the big moment came...squeals of delight were heard from the children as both Mr. and Mrs. Bunny were delivered by the brand new City utility vehicle. The bunnies were introduced by Miss Washington Outstanding Teen, Janae Callaway. The culmination of this exciting day was the egg hunt. After opening the eggs, very excited children flocked to the table to claim their prizes. New this year was a coloring contest with special awards going to the top entries.
