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MINUTES

Richland Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting #1-2014 Richland City Hall – 505 Swift Boulevard – Council Chambers Thursday, January 9, 2014, ~ 7:00 pm

CALL TO ORDER:

Chair Gutierrez called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm.

ATTENDANCE:

Chair Gutierrez, Vice Chair Doran, Commissioners Richards, Valentino, McBurney, Beck, Katipamula. Also in attendance were Council Liaison Kent, Parks and Public Facilities Director Schiessl, Parks and Public Facilities Managers Pinard and Strand, Parks and Facilities Supervisor Sweeney absent.

APPROVAL OF THE JANUARY 9, 2014 AGENDA:

Vice Chair Nancy Doran **moved** to approve the January 9, 2014 agenda as presented. Commissioner Katipamula **seconded** the motion. Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF THE DECEMBER12, 2013 MINUTES:

Commissioner Richards **moved** to approve the December 12, 2013 minutes as presented. Commissioner Doran **seconded** the motion. Motion carried.

COUNCIL LIAISON REPORT:

Council member Kent welcomed the public. Ms. Kent reported that four Council members were successfully sworn in at the last Council meeting. Three of the four are currently in same Council positions; David Rose, Bob Thompson, Sandra Kent and newly elected to the Council, Greg Jones. Kent also mentioned that at the Council meeting a new Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem were selected, David Rose was elected Mayor and Phil Lemley was elected Mayor Pro Tem.

RECREATION REPORT:

Parks and Public Facilities Manager Laurel Strand welcomed the public and informed all of the following events:

- Middle School Night Out! Friday, January 31- 7:00-9:00pm
- Tax Aide Program, Tuesdays & Thursdays 8:30-11:30am
 Ms. Strand explained that the Tax Aide begins February 4-April 15
 AARP Tax Aide volunteers will be available at the Richland Community Center to provide free, confidential service to help seniors, middle and low-income taxpayers prepare their tax returns and to answer questions. Appointments are not necessary.

Goecaching with iPhone class Saturday, January 11- 1:00-3:00pm.

Also Strand mentioned that games begin for youth basketball on Saturday, January 11th and there are currently 74 teams participating consisting of boys and girls grades second though sixth. The basketball league will run for eight weeks and the last game is scheduled for March 1st.

PARKS AND FACILITIES REPORT:

Parks and Public Facilities Manager, Phil Pinard reported the following updates and progress throughout the City:

- The City-wide tree removal in Shelterbelt area, Chaparral Park, Columbia Playfield, Gillespie Parkway, Howard Amon Park, Jefferson Park, and other locations. The City has an inventory of 5,621 trees and has identified 80 trees for removal based on poor health, location to infrastructure, and age. The City is implementing a tree replacement program to compliment the surrounding area and long term maintenance.
- Installation of two drinking fountains in the Paws-abilities Place Dog Park and also a parking area has been provided in the area of the dog park and also for park users.

Pinard also mentioned that all the upgrades to the restrooms in the parks have been completed.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Debbie Berkowitz, 544 Franklin Street, voiced her concerns with the proposed 2014-2018 Parks, Trails & Open Space Master Plan.

PRESENTATIONS:

Cory Bruss, Board member from Columbia River Disc Golf Club presented an overview of the disc golf club accomplishments and events held at James Lawless Park. Mr. Bruss explained the accomplishments to date with the clean-up process and preparation for public use.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

1. DRAFT 2014-2018 Parks, Trails & Open Space Master Plan

Parks and Public Facilities Director, Joe Schiessl presented the Draft 2014-2018 Parks, Trails & Open Space Master Plan.

The Draft 2014-2018 Parks, Trails & Open Space Master Plan to be reviewed and move forward with the Master Plan at the next workshop scheduled for January 23, 2014.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. Proposed AT&T microwave addition at Meadow Springs

Parks and Recreation Manager, Phil Pinard recommended that Council approve the lease amendment with AT&T. Mr. Pinard explained that AT&T is now proposing to attach two new antennas on the equipment within the existing fenced equipment enclosure area. The

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antennas would extend approximately 9 feet above the top of the fence and the dishes are two and three feet in diameter. The fence will be extended to conceal the antennas.

AT&T is proposing to increase the lease fee by \$250 per month as compensation for the improvements. Pinard also mentioned that the current lease fee is \$1,886.50 and this proposed amendment will increase the total monthly lease payment to \$2,136.50.

Vice Chair Doran **moved** that the Parks and Recreation Commission recommend that the Council approve the lease amendment with AT&T. Commissioner Valentino **seconded** the motion. Motion carried.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION COMMENTS:

- Kit McBurney- Appreciated the presence of the restrooms in the parks. Mentioned the Open Space and the natural habitat.
- Nancy Doran Announced the dedication of the art sculpture at the Parkway "Tree of Seasons". Also very appreciative of the two drinking fountains at the dog park.
- Maria Gutierrez Maria will not be present for workshop, January 23. Also announced that the Parks and Recreation Commission are accepting applications for the two vacancies and the closing date for the applications is January 20th.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION (P&RC) GOALS FOR CALENDAR YEAR (CY) 2014

The P&RC annually identifies goals that further the development and enhancement of the City of Richland Parks and Recreation facilities. The goals are measurable with specific performance objectives that can be monitored and tracked throughout the year. The goals and objectives have direct ties to the City of Richland Vision 2030, the CLUP, and PRD Goals for CY 2014. The following are the goals and objectives established by the P&RC for CY 2014. The CY 2014 P&RC goals and objectives were developed based on the P&RC having a more focused impact on the overall betterment of park and recreation facilities and activities.

For CY 2014 the P&RC has identified the following five (5) goals:

P&RC Goal 1 - Continue the practice of inviting user groups and park lessees to make presentations to the Commission to foster partnerships and familiarization. [PTOSMP Goal 9, Key Focus Area 6, Goal 1]

Objective 1 - Arrange a minimum of five (5) user groups and park lessees to make presentations at the P&RC meetings/workshops/tours by end of CY 2014.

P&RC Goal 2 - Work with staff in their effort to identify and promote partnerships with neighboring municipalities, non-profits, or private agencies for four new park and recreation activities. [PTOSMP Goal 1, Objective 4, Key Focus Area 6, Goal 1]

Objective 1 – Meet in a workshop with PRD staff in their effort to identify four new park and recreation activities for CY 201. March xx P&RC Workshop.

P&RC Goal 3 – Develop a short and long term plan aimed at making Richland a more "walkable city". [Strategic Leadership Plan Key Focus Area 7, Goal 2]

Objective 1 – Promote activities to encourage walking (e.g. tree sweaters, art walks, technology/apps for historic walks)

Objective 2 – Meet in a workshop with cyclists to discuss the *cooperation* of cyclists and pedestrian

P&RC Goal 4 - Promote public safety in Richland Park and Recreation Facilities to enhance user friendliness and overall safety [PTOSMP Goal 8 -Objective 3 and 4; Strategic Leadership Plan Key Focus Area 6, Goal 3 and Key Focus Area 7, Goal 1]

Parks and Facilities Division

New Water Fountains at Dog Park

Parks and Facilities' crews installed two new drinking fountains at the Paws-abilities Dog Park at Badger Mountain Community Park on Monday, January 13. Facilities' crews were working on the foundation for the two drinking fountains, which includes separate faucets for human or canine use. The Tri-City Dog Park Society raised money for these drinking fountains.



Removal of Hazardous Trees in Parks

Parks Crews and a supplemental vendor are addressing hazardous trees this month. The Cottonwood (photo on right) in the Gillespie Parkway was removed due to age. Over 50% of the internal structure of the tree was rotted out and presented a danger. Other trees in Jefferson Park, Howard Amon Park, Columbia Playfield and other locations are also being addressed. The City is implementing a corollary tree replacement program to compliment the necessary maintenance. 80 of the City's 5,621 inventoried trees have been identified for removal.





Library Landscape

Parks and Facilities crews completed the low maintenance landscaping replacement at the Library. Vegetation was removed that trapped leaves and litter. Basalt rock was placed in the landscaping beds and ornamental grasses will be planted when the weather improves.



Goethals Park

Crews began the installation of the hillside slide in the Goethals Park nature playground. The slide was purchased by the Columbia Center Rotary as a component of a Park partnership program grant.



Drollinger Park

Irrigation began at Drollinger Park which is located in the Tanglewood neighborhood on the west side of the By-Pass Highway. Irrigation and turf will be completed this year.



Tree Removal Continues

Dangerous, diseased and damaged tree removal continues in Howard Amon Park, McMurray Park and other locations.



Columbia Playfields

Field preparation for the upcoming softball season has begun at Columbia Playfields and Horn Rapids Athletic Complex.



McMurray Community Gardens

Benton County work crew did an amazing job, preparing the McMurray community gardens for Spring 2014 gardening season. The work crews are also in the process of spreading wood chips around the plots.





Planning and Construction Division

John Dam Plaza Sidewalks

The contract for the sidewalk project has been awarded to 2F Enterprises of Kennewick. Work will beign in February weather permitting. This project is funded through Business License reserve fund and is contained in the 2014 Capital Improvement Program.

Drollinger Park

City Parks and Facilities crews began work on installing the irrigation system at Drollinger Park. Work this year will consist of the irrigation and turf. This park constuction is funded through Park District 3 funds and is included in the 2014 Capital Imprtrovement Program. Drollinger Park is located in the Tanglewood neighborhood on the west side of SR-240 north of Duportail St.



Stevens Triangle Gateway Project

City Parks and Facilities crew are extending the irrigation system to the north end of the berm. In March volunteers will plant grasses and other plants and rock ground covering will be placed. Gateway projects have beebn identified in the 2012, 2013 and 2014 Capital Improvement Program.



Keene Road landscaping

The landscaping rock placement has been completed along Keene Road adjacent to Cherrywood estates and Badger Park Estates. C & E Trenching of Pasco was contracted to spread the last 800 yards of rock to complete the project. This project was in the 2013 and 2014 Capital Improvement Program and was funded with Realestate Excise Tax and Undesignated park reserve funds.
