MINUTES

Richland Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting # 5-2014 Richland City Hall – 505 Swift Boulevard – Council Chambers Thursday, July 10, 2014 ~ 7:00 p.m.

CALL TO ORDER:

Chair Gutierrez called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

ATTENDANCE:

Vice Chair Doran, Commissioners Buelt, Finch, McBurney, Beck and Katipamula were present. Chair Gutierrez, Commissioners Richards and Valentino excused. Also in attendance were Council Liaison Kent, Parks and Public Facilities Director Schiessl, Parks and Public Facilities Managers Strand, Parks and Facilities Supervisor Sweeney.

APPROVAL OF THE July 10, 2014 AGENDA:

Commissioner Beck **moved** to approve the July 10, 2014 agenda. Commissioner Buelt **seconded** the motion. Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF THE May 8, 2014 MINUTES:

Carl Berkowitz representative for 3 *Rivers Bicycle Coalition*, presented an overview of how to make Richland a more bicycle friendly community and why Richland should encourage cycling.

COUNCIL LIASON REPORT:

Council member Kent welcomed the public. Kent reported Council held a public hearing regarding the Shoreline Master Plan, which the Shoreline Master Plan was approved by Council. Also Kent reported that Council accepted comment from the public and approved the Transportation Improvement Plan.

RECREATION REPORT:

Parks and Public Facilities Manager Laurel Strand welcomed the public and informed all of the following events:

- Summer Movie Series Monsters University, Friday, July 11th at John Dam Plaza.

• Senior Picnic – Richland will host the 21st Annual Senior Picnic on Thursday, September 18th at Howard Amon Park. Tickets are now available at the Community Center.

PARKS AND FACILITIES REPORT:

Facilities Supervisor Darrin Sweeney reported the following updates and progress throughout the City:

- Facility crews have been working hard to keep grass green with maintaining irrigation lines as well as the pool and splash and play.
- The new roof at George Prout pool is complete and also the interior has been retiled.
- Richland Little League hosted a state tournament at Badger Mountain playfields.
 Fields were prepped by facility crew for this tournament in partnership with Richland Little League.
- Drinking fountains; all but two of the drinking fountains are available for use in the parks.

Sweeney also mentioned how appreciative he is with the facility crew and all the work that they do.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Expansion of Trailhead Park Parking

Laurie Ness, 2253 Davison Avenue – Ness suggested collecting data of use at Trailhead Park before adding additional parking. Ness also would like to see more signage added for parking.

Bill Barr, 72 Willis – Supported the first two options with additional parking at Trailhead Park. Barr voiced his concerns with option three.

Hans Brandal, 1265 Plateau Drive – Supported additional of parking at Trailhead Park. Brandal voiced his concerns with patrons parking on the street near Trailhead Park.

Rob Hastings, 1277 White Bluffs Street – Supported additional parking at Trailhead Park and has added the option of additional parking south of the park. Hasting voiced his concerns with the option two.

Patrick Paulson, 2253 Davison Avenue – Voiced his concerns with a contractor's property damage at the Leslie Groves undeveloped area.

Mark Showalter, 1300 Alla Vista Street – Supported additional parking at Trailhead Park. Showalter suggested a fourth option which is to take the upper portion south of the park off and add additional parking in that location.

Dirk Peterson, 2107 Rainer Avenue – Supported additional parking at Trailhead Park. Peterson is in favor of option one and also some expansion west of the park.

Cindi Brandal, 1265 Plateau Drive – Supported additional parking at Trailhead Park. Brandal mentioned the large amount of use at the Badger Mountain flats land. Brandal is also in favor of additional parking south of the park and to add another tier to the current parking lot.

Russ Treat, 184 Llandwood Court – Supported additional parking at Trailhead Park. Treat suggested that a one-way access to parking be added just to the north of the restrooms at the park and use the existing exit.

Public comment closed at 7:44 p.m.

PRESENTATIONS:

President of Richland National Little League, Gary Watkins presented an overview of the league. Watkins mentioned that Richland will be hosting the State All-Star tournament this year. The tournament will bring in thirteen teams, including families and friends from around the state. Gary expressed his appreciation with the partnership with the City on preparation of the fields at Badger Mountain Park.

SUBJECT: GALA PARK

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Parks and Recreation Commission recommend allocating \$30,000 of Park District 5 funds to Gala Park for playground safety surfacing, curbing and sidewalks.

MOTION FOR CONSIDERATION

I move that the Parks and Recreation Commission forward a recommendation to Council to allocate \$30,000 of Park District 5 funds to Gala Park for playground safety surfacing, curbing and sidewalks.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is currently \$25,000 remaining in the project budget. The estimates cost to complete the remaining work is \$55,000. Park District funds are generated from the collection of park impact fees from new single/multi family home construction. Park impact fees are required to be used to build park infrastructure.

BACKGROUND

Phase 1 of the development of the park was completed May of 2014 which inculed irrigation, turf and trees. The remaining items to complete are the installation of the playground, sidewalks and a park bench.

The City has adopted new playground safety surfacing standards and is transitioning away from the engineered wood fiber material due to high maintenance costs and accessability issues. The new surfacing costs are double that of the wood fiber material which has necessitated the request for additional funding.

SUBJECT: STEVENS PARK MASTER PLAN

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Parks and Recreation Commission recommend approval of the master plan for Stevens Park and to allocate \$5,000 of Undesignated Park Reserve Funds to cover permitting fees for the project.

MOTION FOR CONSIDERATION

I move that the Parks and Recreation Commission forward a recommendation to Council to approve the Stevens Park Master Plan and to allocate \$5,000 of Undesignated Park Reserve Funds to the project for permitting fees.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact associated with approval of the master plan. Construction of the restroom will require funding from the City of approximately \$5,000 to cover permit fees.

BACKGROUND

The adoption of a master plan for Stevens Park has been prompted by a request from Boy Scout Ryan Warren to construct a restroom at Stevens Park for his Eagle Scout project. The proposal was introduced to the PRC at their June workshop. The PRC supported the request and suggested that the neighbors be contacted and comments gathered regarding the restroom proposal and any other elements that neighbors would like to see in the park and that staff prepare a master plan for the park.

On August 5th forty notices were delivered to the neighbors of the park inviting them to the August PRC meeting to provide comments on Stevens Park amenities.

The proposed restroom will be similar to the one constructed at Jeannette Taylor Park. Ryan will solicit donations and contractors to complete the construction.

The Stevens Park location was chosen as the Warrens attend the Richland Lutheran Church across Stevens Drive. The Church uses the park for many activities and Ryan determined that restrooms would be a very worthwhile amenity for all park users. The City also schedules coach pitch and T-ball in the park.


Richland Library Service Project
